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I. FOREWORD

Public Libraries are, and have always been, a central hub for information access, community assistance, and civic and cultural education. They serve the needs of their communities in remarkably diverse ways, providing internet access, research assistance, government resource education, and too many varieties of special programming to name. In Texas, one lesser-known service they provide is access to in-person voter registration and assistance with registration forms in a State where it is harder to register to vote than nearly anywhere in the country. As one of only a handful of states that still does not offer online or automatic voter registration, public libraries are a central part of Texas's voter registration regime, providing opportunities and assistance for diverse communities, who often have very little knowledge of these processes. Texas continues to have millions of eligible, but un-registered potential voters, not to mention some 400,000 Texans that turn 18 and about 100,000 Texans that become naturalized citizens every year, each of whom must navigate the voter registration process for the very first time.

While most libraries are enthusiastic about this particular community service, they do not have a choice in providing it. The National Voter Registration Act and the Texas Election Code collectively require libraries to perform this function for their communities, big and small, in every corner of the State. For decades, many libraries have dutifully provided some form of voter registration opportunity, including many with internal procedures that appear compliant if followed. Others, however, as are the subject of this Report, have entirely neglected these duties or provided only partial assistance, outsourced their responsibilities to community volunteers and non-profit organizers, failed to properly train library employees and volunteers about their duties, and failed to submit their particular library procedures to the State for evaluation and approval.

In the spring of 2020, as COVID-19 shuttered public libraries across Texas, voting rights advocates around the state—not knowing the extent of non-compliance that already exist-

ed—grew concerned that this particular avenue for voter registration guaranteed to Texas voters would be largely unavailable prior to the 2020 General Election, potentially preventing thousands of voters from accessing the ballot box. These library closures, it seemed, would prevent access to in-person voter registration in many areas of the State where no other option for in-person registration exists.

By all accounts, State election officials were blind to or ignored this potential threat to voter access, as, it seems, they had been to library registration generally. And, while the original concerns surrounding COVID-19 closures turned out to be well-founded (almost all library voter registration programs were halted during the pandemic), the extent of more general non-compliance with the rules was shocking. First, not a single library in the State had ever submitted an NVRA implementation plan outlining its procedures in the 25 years since that requirement was passed into law, and there is no indication that the Secretary of State had ever asked libraries to do so before this investigation. Further, TCRP discovered that many libraries did not actually offer voter registration at all, did not accept forms from voters as required, did not offer assistance with forms, or only passively provided forms at a reference desk. Very few were using the official form for libraries that must be used to track library registration numbers, and even fewer had been conducting training of employees and volunteers as required by law. While all of these rules should have been enforced by the Secretary of State, there was insufficient or no guidance at all to libraries about these mandatory procedures. Even some county voter registrars—who are in charge of registering voters in each county and regularly receive instructions from the Secretary of State—were unaware of libraries' special role in the voter registration process, and had apparently never been advised about it. We will likely never know the number of voters who were disenfranchised because of these failures over the course of decades.

The Texas Civil Rights Project, working with voting rights advocates across Texas, has

stepped up to fill the gap left by the State's inaction. As detailed in this Report, our voting rights team has spent nearly two years investigating this issue and educating libraries across the State. And, seemingly for the first time in Texas' history, TCRP has gathered the data necessary to understand the current landscape of noncompliance. Through our work, hundreds of libraries have seemingly come into compliance with the law, representing new registration opportunities for likely tens of thousands of voters every year. This Report details those findings, the state of compliance, and concludes with calls to action for Texas's election officials as well as for community members interested in helping us ensure the preservation of voting rights for all Texans.

III. HIGHLIGHTS OF TCRP'S INVESTIGATION

- Beginning in the spring of 2020, TCRP's investigation into voter registration practices at public libraries revealed that not a single public library in the State was fully compliant with its obligations under the Texas Election Code and the National Voter Registration Act (NVRA).
- TCRP engaged in a broad and sweeping education campaign to public libraries about their voter registration responsibilities and the need to file an NVRA implementation plan with the State so that library practices could be evaluated and approved.
- From the summer of 2020 through the end of 2021, TCRP sent thousands of letters and e-mails to libraries and discussed NVRA procedures with hundreds of individual library directors and employees, county voter registrars, and the Secretary of State.
- Based on TCRP's investigation and numerous Public Information Act requests, TCRP's outreach appears to have helped more than 290 independent library systems, representing more than a thousand individual library branches, come into compliance with voter registration program requirements. This represents an increase from 0% to more than 60% of libraries in apparent compliance, and an additional 15% who have begun the compliance process.
- This increase in registration opportunities will significantly benefit communities with relatively few other voter registration options: rural voters, voters with disabilities, voters experiencing homelessness, voters without internet access and with limited financial resources, young and first-time voters, and voters of color.
- TCRP conservatively estimates that the libraries now in full compliance with their obligations under the NVRA will collectively register at least 75,000 voters for the first time or at a new address every year, representing more than 300,000 registrations from the start of this investigation through the 2024 presidential election.
- Nevertheless, about 25% of all public libraries in the State remain out of compliance with their voter registration obligations, have ignored recent Secretary of State (SOS) guidance to libraries prompted by this investigation, and have not responded to multiple attempts from TCRP to offer assistance with the compliance process.

IV. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The National Voter Registration Act ("NVRA") requires states that have not adopted automatic voter registration to designate certain public offices as "Voter Registration Agencies."¹ These Voter Registration Agencies are required to offer voter registration to the public in certain specific ways. In 1995, after passage of the NVRA, Texas designated public libraries as one category of publicly funded offices that must serve as Voter Registration Agencies if they meet certain funding and hours-of-operation requirements.²

Beginning in 2020, the Texas Civil Rights Project learned that of the more than 500 independent public library systems in Texas—comprised of thousands of local branches—not a single public library was in full compliance with its obligations under the Texas Election Code. That is, not a single public library in the 25 years since being designated as Voter Registration Agencies, had ever submitted an "NVRA Implementation Plan" to the Texas Secretary of State. This plan is required by the Texas Election Code so that compliance with registration procedures, assistance to voters, and training procedures can be evaluated and approved by State authorities and be available for public inspection. While many libraries had been providing some form of voter registration opportunities for many years, TCRP learned that many others had never heard of these rules at all, or only provided passive voter registration (for example, leaving stacks of voter registration forms on a library display).

This initial finding raised serious questions as to whether libraries were providing the voter registration opportunities guaranteed to Texans by the NVRA and the Texas Election Code. After TCRP sent thousands of letters to library directors, discussed requirements with hundreds of librarians and county election officials, and issued public records requests to

various election authorities, more than 290 different library systems have now submitted an NVRA Implementation Plan as of January 1, 2022 and about 70 others are in the process of doing so.

Still, at least 100 library systems remain out of compliance, have ignored all offers of assistance, and have taken no apparent steps toward compliance after receiving multiple communications from TCRP as well as an official advisory from the Texas Secretary of State that was brought about by this investigation.

While this is significant progress, there is much work left to do to guarantee that every Texan in every community across the State has access to the voter registration opportunities guaranteed to them by law. TCRP continues to offer assistance to libraries and has developed educational materials to help libraries more easily train staff and volunteers. Nevertheless, TCRP calls on the Texas Secretary of State to fulfill his duties to protect Texans' voting rights, and calls on our communities to assist us in ensuring that every public library is conforming to the law.

V. THE NATIONAL VOTER REGISTRATION ACT AND VOTER REGISTRATION AGENCIES

In 1993, Congress passed the National Voter Registration Act, or “NVRA,” which requires each state to designate certain types of publicly-funded offices as “Voter Registration Agencies.” These Voter Registration Agencies are meant to provide easy access to voter registration all across the country. In 1995, the State of Texas designated public libraries as one category of publicly-funded offices that are required to serve as Voter Registration Agencies pursuant to the federal law.³ Since that time, libraries across the state have served a key role in providing access to voter registration in nearly every Texas community, big and small.

NVRA REQUIREMENTS FOR VOTER REGISTRATION AGENCIES

The most basic requirement for Voter Registration Agencies, including Texas libraries, is very simply that each patron of that agency must be affirmatively offered the opportunity to register to vote every time they register for a new service, or renew or change their address with the agency. This means that a Voter Registration Agency staff member or volunteer who interacts with patrons in these types of situations must ask the patron “Would you like to register to vote?”

Again, an *affirmative* offer of registration is required, not just providing a stack of forms on a table. Voter registration must be offered to every single patron in these situations unless the agency’s records already indicate that the person would not be eligible to register to vote. Generally, this exception applies to minors for whom the agency’s records indicate are younger than 17 (while a voter must be 18 years old to register to vote, voters who are at least 17 and 10 months old may still be able to register if they will turn 18 years old before the next election).

An exception might also apply if the agency requires citizenship information, or in the library context, if the library requires that information in order to obtain a library card. If that is the case, the agency does not need to offer voter registration to those patrons who have identified themselves as non-citizens at the time of the current transaction. It is important to note, however, that previous records of citizenship may not be accurate at the time of a renewal or address change as more than 100,000 Texans become naturalized citizens every year. This means that an agency must still offer voter registration to patrons even if old library records indicate that a patron was not a citizen at the time of a previous application for services.

However, the exceptions above do not apply if the agency does not collect information on age or

citizenship as part of its regular application or registration procedures; every person must be offered registration—it is up to the patron to select the correct boxes for citizenship and age on their form. These agencies are prohibited by state law from inquiring into the eligibility of potential voters unless that information is already collected as part of normal application process.

In addition to offering registration, if an agency patron indicates that they would like to register to vote, the agency staff or volunteers are also required to provide assistance with the application to the same extent that they provide assistance with the agency’s own forms. This could mean providing assistance with filling out the form, assistance in a different language, or other assistance depending on the regular procedures of the agency. For example, if a library regularly provides assistance to patrons in Spanish, it must also offer to provide assistance in Spanish with the voter registration process.

Once a voter has completed a voter registration form, the agency staff member or volunteer must offer to accept the form for the voter, and the agency must submit that form on behalf of the voter directly to the appropriate county voter registrar—for libraries, this must be done within 5 days. Unlike voter registration applications put in the mail, applications submitted to a library are backdated by the voter registrar to be effective on the day that the library received them. This is why it is extremely important that libraries deliver these forms directly to their county voter registrar and not simply drop them in the mail. If a voter registration deadline is approaching, failing to comply with this requirement could result in the library inadvertently causing a voter to be barred from voting, even though they registered on time.

VI. TEXAS LIBRARIES AND VOTER REGISTRATION

Because Libraries have been designated by the State of Texas as “Voter Registration Agencies” in the Texas Election Code, all of the rules outlined in the previous section apply to them. In deciding to designate public libraries as Voter Registration Agencies, the Texas Legislature recognized the important role that libraries play in their communities and libraries’ unique ability to reach groups of people who may find it difficult to register to vote elsewhere. These include low-income voters, rural voters, voters with disabilities, young voters, voters experiencing homelessness, and voters who move residences frequently.⁴ Moreover, in Texas, these categories of voters are disproportionately voters of color, who have historically—and who continue to—encounter significant barriers to civic participation.⁵ In this way, libraries are an essential component in encouraging good citizenship and community engagement in very diverse and often-underserved communities. And public libraries are everywhere, in every community—big and small—in every corner of the State.

SPECIAL RULES FOR LIBRARIES

Libraries are required by state law to use the official voter registration application created for libraries by the Texas Secretary of State. While there are other generic registration forms that would be effective for registration purposes, this library-specific form is coded so that the county voter registrar and the Secretary of State can determine that it originated from a public library.

These forms are available for free by simply requesting them through the Texas Secretary of State’s online form, or by calling the Elections Division of the Secretary of State’s Office.

All libraries in Texas should have a sufficient supply of registration forms at all times, including in English, Spanish, and any other language that their county may require. For example, many counties in Texas are also required by federal law to provide voting materials in certain Asian languages. If you are unsure about the requirements for your library, your county voter registrar will be able to provide this information.

ADDITIONAL BEST PRACTICES FOR PUBLIC LIBRARIES

There are a number of other procedures that libraries either are required to perform or should perform as Voter Registration Agencies. In addition to the requirements explained above, libraries are required to make sure that all employees and volunteers who may interact with library patrons in circumstances where offering voter registration is required have completed training on voter registration procedures. The “Training” section of this Report below includes more details about this requirement, and where libraries can access useful training materials.

Additionally, libraries are required to keep an up to date “NVRA Implementation Plan” on file with the Texas Secretary of State. If a library’s policies or procedures have changed, this plan must be updated immediately so that the changes may be evaluated and approved by the state authority in charge of enforcing these rules, and be made available to the public.

Additional best practices that are optional for libraries, but that many libraries have incorporated to better serve their communities include the following:

- making forms available to all patrons in visible areas of the library,
- making clear that library staff is able to accept these forms directly without any need to mail them,
- providing links to voter registration forms on the library’s public website,⁶ and
- providing non-partisan voter guides in public areas to help educate potential voters about what and who will be on their ballots.⁷

VII. LATEST COMPLIANCE FINDINGS AND ANALYSIS

A. INVESTIGATION BACKGROUND

The rules and procedures outlined above are an important part of Texas's voting infrastructure, and are the implementation of procedures that grant certain rights to Texas voters. In late 2019, TCRP had encountered several libraries that were not providing voter registration at all, in clear violation of the NVRA and the Texas Election Code. These libraries had been largely outsourcing this obligation to occasional private volunteers, like the League of Women Voters, and had no knowledge that the law required them to provide these services to all library patrons, every day. Additionally, these were not small libraries either, but major city and county-run libraries in one of the most populous counties in the State. At that time, TCRP believed this to be an isolated misunderstanding, and engaged in specific educational outreach on the issue with those libraries' directors.

At that time, TCRP had assumed that most libraries must have been in compliance with these rules because they had been in effect since 1993—more than 25 years. But even if this was not a reasonable assumption, it was not immediately clear how TCRP—being a relatively small nonprofit—could plausibly test for compliance at more than 500 libraries and library systems—representing thousands of individual branch locations—when each library would require city or county residency for a patron to be eligible for a library card. With these difficulties, a larger investigation did not immediately begin after resolving what appeared to be an isolated issue. It would later become clear that this assumption was far off, and that it is unlikely that anyone—whether private advocates or government officials—had ever investigated whether libraries were complying with these rules prior to TCRP's investigation.

When COVID-19 hit in the spring of 2020, the closure of most libraries across the State raised red flags about the effect those closures would have on voter registration opportunities. With the assumption that libraries were providing these services, it stood to reason that many thousands of voters would be denied this particular avenue for registration guaranteed to them by State and federal law. With that concern in mind, TCRP sent a Public Information Act request to the Secretary of State in the spring of 2020 requesting the most recent NVRA implementation plan filed by each library in the State. It was presumed that this would allow voting rights advocates to evaluate these plans and determine where they might have room for offering in-person registration, even during a pandemic. What TCRP received back was shocking. The Texas Secretary of State indicated that they had no such plan on file—ever, for any library in the State. Or in other words, *in the 25 years that libraries had been required to file and have approved a voter registration implementation plan, not a single one had ever done so. And, even worse, there is no indication that any state official ever tried to enforce the law despite the Secretary of State's responsibility to ensure uniform compliance with the Texas Election Code.*

This, in conjunction with TCRP's recent experience of finding non-compliance in a major Texas library system, raised significant questions about whether any libraries were actually providing voter registration as required. But to find out if that were the case, TCRP had to develop a plan that could test compliance during a pandemic, and in a way that was helpful to libraries and librarians who were understandably already struggling to meet the needs of their communities.

B. METHODOLOGY

With the knowledge that no library in Texas was in full compliance with their voter registration duties in the Texas Election Code due to having never submitted an implementation plan, TCRP had a useful starting point to check compliance and offer education to libraries. Of course, this does not mean that no libraries had been providing any services at all, or even that some libraries were not in full compliance but for submitting a plan. But, it did provide the opportunity to check with each library about their practices and determine if they had put sufficient plans together to ensure day-to-day compliance.

An implementation plan requires certain information to be shared with the State and the public, including the person responsible for voter registration at each library, how training will be conducted, how forms will be collected and timely returned to the voter registrar, and other basic information that would indicate that a library has thought through their obligations and formalized procedures for consistent and uniform application. If a plan was submitted by a library, we could consider this at least an important indication that actual compliance is happening in day-to-day operations of the library. Therefore, our investigation relied on providing education and outreach about the requirements of the NVRA, giving specific notice about the library's violation of the law by not having a plan on file, and offering to assist in developing a plan. Once that outreach was done, TCRP would follow up with additional records requests to the State to determine which libraries had come into compliance, and attempt to follow up with those who had not.

If a plan was on file, we considered that library in compliance for purposes of this investigation. It was not within the scope of this investigation—and likely would be impossible—for TCRP to actually check for compliance through in-person visits, even assuming a non-pandemic environment. This made plan-filing our primary indicator of compliance, which we supplemented with our conversations with librarians. Accordingly, it is entirely possible that libraries listed as compliant in this Report are not following through with their newly-submitted policies and procedures. Likewise, it is possible that non-compliant libraries listed in this Report are actually providing voter registration in their day-to-day operations, but simply have not complied with their duty to submit those procedures to the State for approval. (But note: you can help TCRP confirm actual compliance by visiting your local library and reporting back to us with the online form described at the end of this Report!).

TCRP's outreach and education to libraries began first in the summer of 2020 with libraries serving major metropolitan areas, with TCRP focusing on making sure that voter registration was available to as many people as possible prior to the voter registration deadline for the November 2020 General Election. That included significant outreach by phone and e-mail in the Houston, Dallas, and Austin areas, especially. And it included infographics explaining the NVRA and Texas public libraries' role in the voter registration apparatus that libraries could post for employees and volunteers (pictured below). While that outreach was effective in explaining the rules, and, we believe, in ensuring that voter registration was offered at libraries that were not still closed due to COVID-19, it did not result in many—or any—implementation plans being filed by the end of 2020.

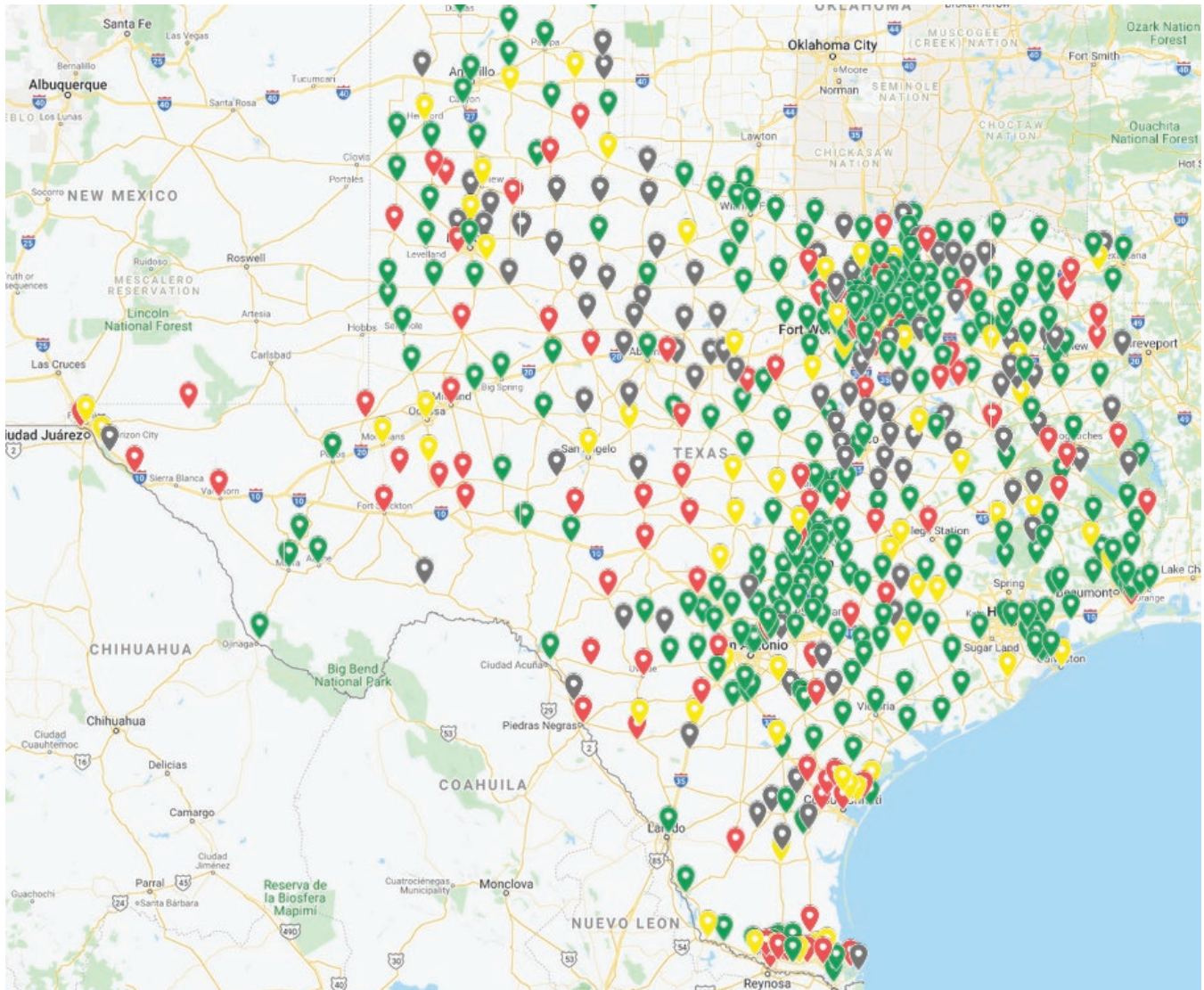
At the start of 2021, TCRP worked to expand its reach and better explain the deficiencies involved. TCRP sent written letters to every library that appeared to be covered by the rules in the Texas Election Code, explained the rules in great detail, and offered to provide assistance in training, in understanding the rules, and in developing an implementation plan or providing examples of plans from other libraries. Over the course of several months in the spring of 2021, TCRP attorneys spoke with hundreds of librarians over the phone and by e-mail, reviewed hundreds of drafts of implementation plans, and worked collaboratively with libraries to get access to training materials and get plans on file.

During this process, TCRP also sent a half-dozen Public Information Act Requests to the Secretary of State's Office to acquire copies of submitted plans and communications with libraries. These materials showed numerous inquiries to the SOS directly about TCRP's correspondence, often questioning why the library had never heard of these rules. As a direct result of those inquiries that were flooding the SOS's office, on June 21, 2021, the Secretary issued a new elections advisory by e-mail to public libraries, largely echoing the letters TCRP had previously sent. At the time of that advisory, TCRP estimated that about 150 libraries had come into compliance by submitting an implementation plan. Unsure if the Secretary's guidance would reach librarians by digital means, however, TCRP sent a second round of correspondence to all libraries that had not yet filed a plan and included a printed copy of the Secretary's advisory, along with additional offers of assistance in navigating the rules. In that second round of correspondence in the fall of 2021, TCRP asked each library to come into compliance by November of 2021 and indicated that a failure to do so would result in their inclusion in this Report as non-compliant libraries. Despite that deadline, TCRP waited until the end of the calendar year to finalize data for this Report, which is accurate as of January 1, 2022.

D. COMPLIANCE FINDINGS AS OF JANUARY 1, 2022.

1. GENERAL FINDINGS AND SUMMARY

By the end of 2021, after numerous outreach attempts to every public library in the State and numerous requests made pursuant to the Texas Public Information Act to confirm compliance, TCRP determined that 285 libraries and library systems had submitted the mandatory NVRA implementation plan to the Texas Secretary of State, and an additional 72 libraries had begun that process or were seeking internal approval of a developed plan, according to their communications with TCRP attorneys. These libraries are represented in green and yellow, respectively, in the map below.



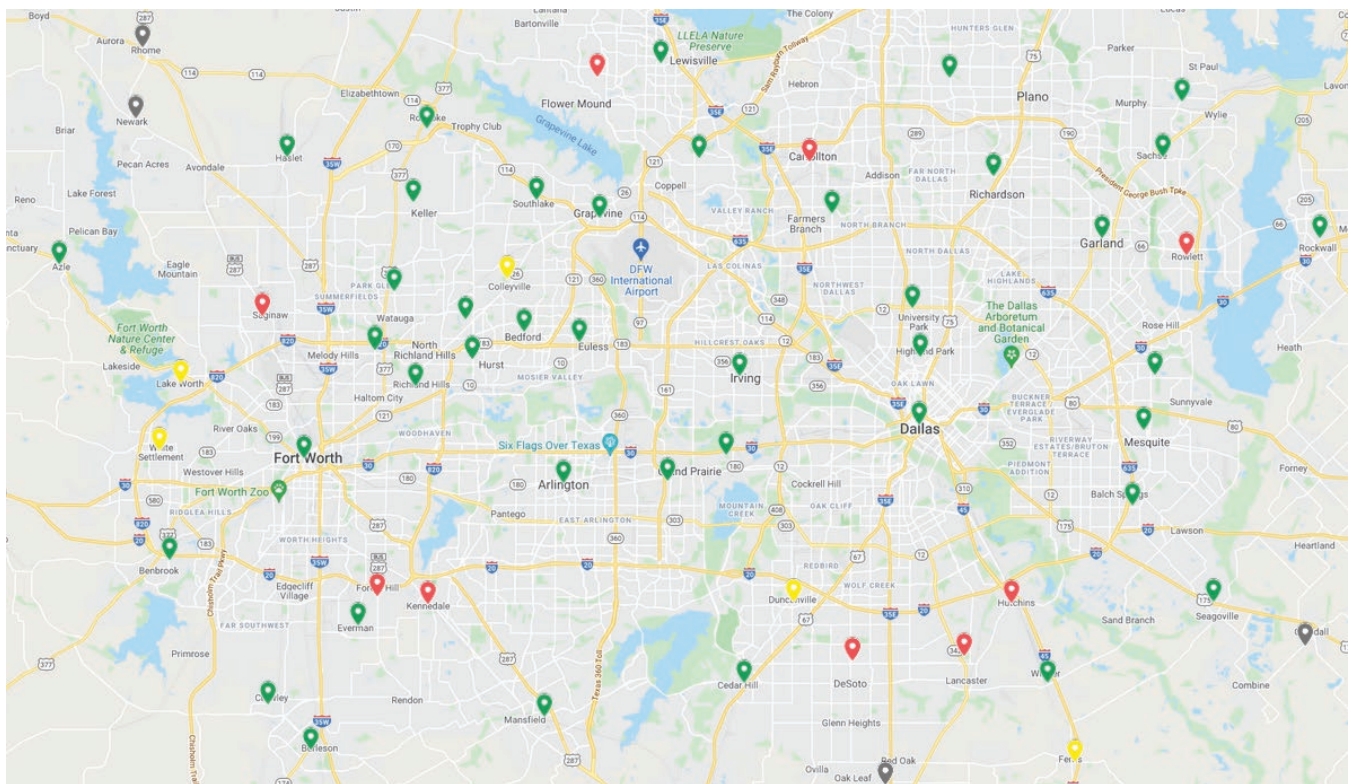
However, of the libraries who had received communications from TCRP, 107 remained out of compliance with no plan on file with the State at the start of 2022, and had ignored all offers of assistance and communication. Those libraries are indicated in red in the map below. While these libraries may be offering some form of voter registration opportunities, the lack of an approved NVRA implementation plan itself makes them non-compliant with state law. It must be noted again, however, that this data is accurate as of January 1, 2022, with these libraries having received at least two separate outreach attempts from TCRP and at least one advisory from the Texas Secretary of State over the past year.

Indicated in grey are libraries or library systems that are not required to comply with the NVRA due to either being open for 30 hours or fewer per week or because they are entirely privately funded. TCRP found 103 “public” libraries in this category around the State. Some of these libraries, however, provide voter registration services voluntarily, but may not offer the extent of services required of other libraries, especially related to the collection and return of forms on voters' behalf.

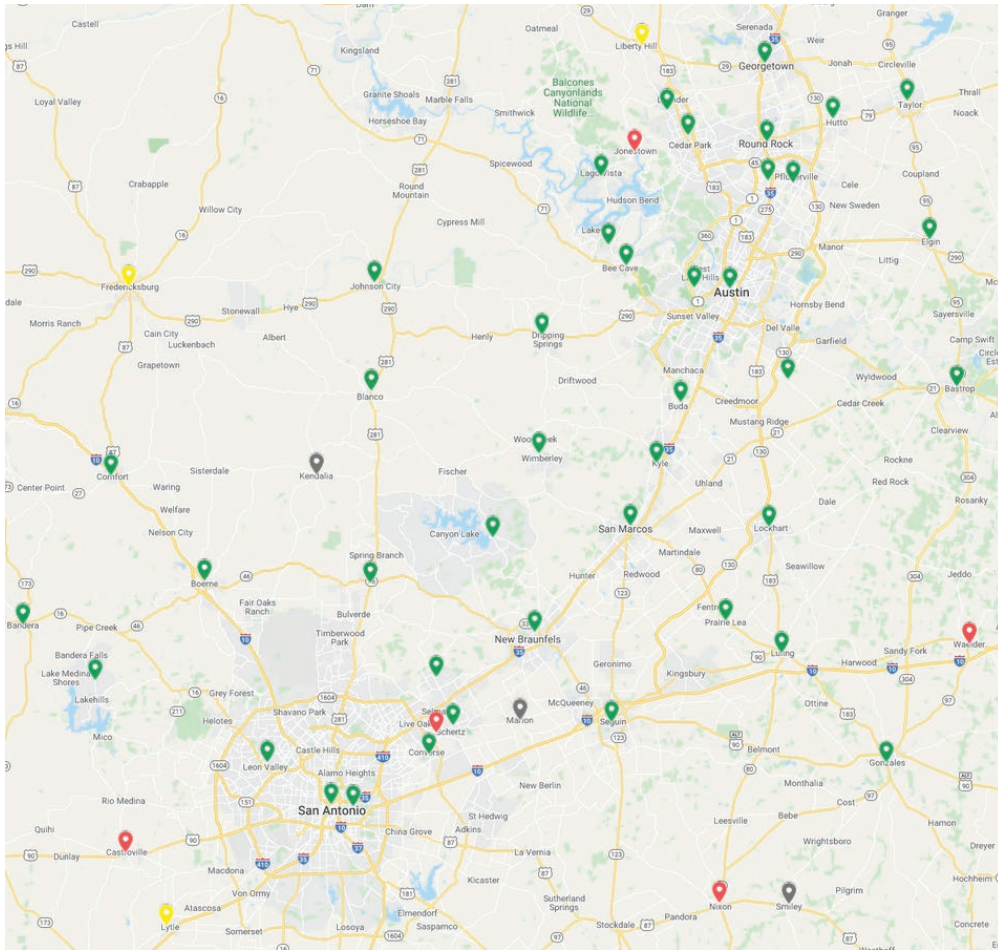

2. SIGNIFICANT COMPLIANCE IN MAJOR METRO AREAS

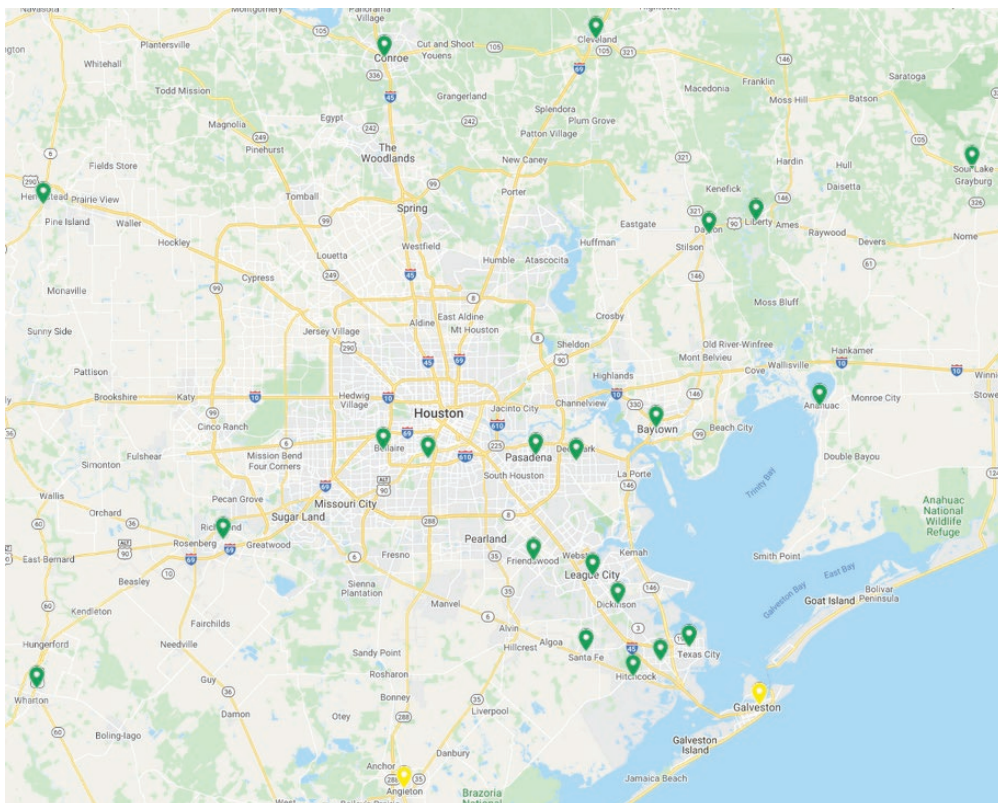
Particularly encouraging has been the rapid response from most larger library systems, representing thousands of individual library branches in major metropolitan areas. As the maps below indicate, the vast majority of libraries, including each of the largest library systems in Texas, has now submitted NVRA implementation plans outlining their policies, procedures, and training protocols. Many of these libraries have leaned into their new understandings about these duties as well. For example, the Dallas Public Library not only submitted its compliant plan to the State in 2021, but also organized trainings for other libraries and volunteered its staff to appear in TCRP's training video for librarians (which is detailed in the next section of this Report). Similarly, the Harris County Library System and the Dripping Springs Public Library both offered the use of their facilities for developing a training program in addition to submitting their own comprehensive plans as well.

Austin – San Antonio Corridor

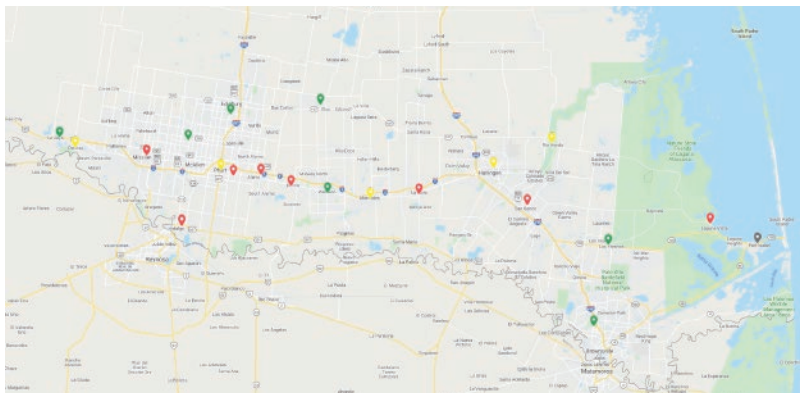

3. CONTINUED NON-COMPLIANCE

While TCRP's education efforts have helped hundreds of libraries come into compliance with their voter registration obligations, more than 100 libraries or library systems in the state—including some in large population centers—remain out of compliance and have ignored all offers of assistance with navigating the voter registration procedures.

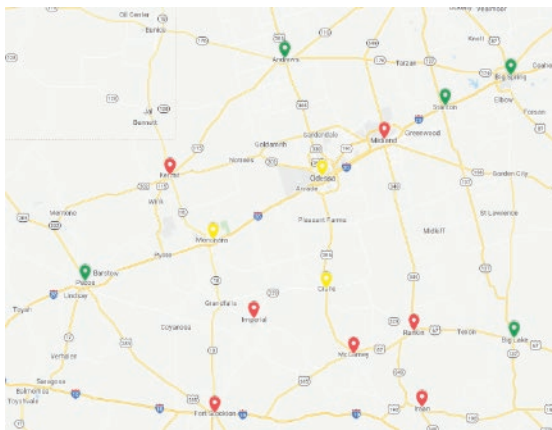
Troublingly, some of the areas with the most prevalent non-compliance are also those areas of the State with the greatest percentage of Latino voters, including the Rio Grande Valley, greater-El Paso, Midland/Odessa, and the Corpus Christi Bay Area.⁸ About 20% of all non-compliant libraries and library systems in the State come from these four regions.



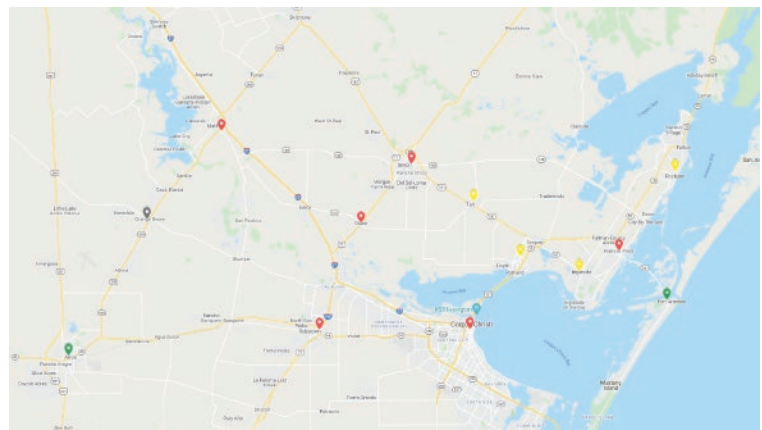
Rio Grande Valley

In 2022, TCRP will continue to make efforts to bring these libraries into compliance and provide assistance with understanding the law. As described in more detail in the following sections, TCRP will also provide additional materials to help libraries train their employees and volunteers, and will call for the assistance of the Texas Secretary of State in bringing these libraries into compliance in accordance with his duties under the Texas Election Code.

VIII. TRAINING FOR LIBRARY STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS

The Texas Election Code requires that every library employee or volunteer who might engage with patrons in circumstances where offering voter registration is required must be trained on these duties. A library's implementation plan must also explain the training it provides. Many libraries, however, have found that training materials are sparse and that the rules outlined in the Election Code are not always easy to understand. The Texas Secretary of State is required by statute⁹ to provide materials for training employees, but the extent of these materials to date is a PowerPoint presentation available on the SOS website that does little more than list (but not explain) the rules as they appear in the Election Code.¹⁰ Nevertheless, the official training materials provided by the SOS are the primary training materials currently used by most libraries who have submitted an implementation plan, and certainly provide a useful tool for libraries that have not developed their own training.

In response to the repeated requests from libraries for help with training and the general lack of training materials publicly available for libraries or produced by the Secretary of State, TCRP, with assistance from the League of Women Voters of Texas, has developed an easily consumable and sharable training video that can be easily integrated into employee and volunteer orientation and incorporated into library renewal trainings for existing employees. The training video tracks all requirements of the Texas Election Code and includes the additional best practices outlined in prior sections of this Report. Further, the video walks through a standard voter registration form, section by section, to help library staff understand what each section of the form requires, and the common questions they might get from library patrons.

The "Voter Registration Training for Libraries" video features Teresa Carbajal Ravet, Trustee of the Friends of the Dripping Springs Community Library and President of the League of Women Voters of Hays County, Annie Johnson Benifield, President of the League of Women Voters of Houston, and Heather Lowe, Director of Adult Services with the Dallas Public Library.

IX. THE TEXAS SECRETARY OF STATE AND TEXAS PUBLIC LIBRARIES

The Texas Secretary of State has special duties surrounding the application and enforcement of the Texas Election Code and the National Voter Registration Act.¹¹ These include ensuring uniformity around the State, issuing advisories and written instructions, providing assistance and advice, and protecting the voting rights of all Texans.¹² For libraries specifically, the Secretary must also develop and provide training on voter registration, evaluate and approve voter registration implementation plans, and develop voter registration forms specifically for libraries and provide them to libraries at no cost. The Secretary is also empowered to prescribe additional procedures to ensure that these rules are properly administered.¹³

With the finding in this Report, it is clear that the Secretary of State has provided insufficient guidance and assistance to libraries to ensure the uniform application of voter registration rules across the State. While the Secretary's June 21, 2021 advisory to libraries was a helpful step in the right direction, it is clear that it was not enough to bring all libraries into compliance nor for libraries to understand what is required of them.

With the publication of this Report, the authors request the Secretary of State take the following additional actions to assist public libraries, ensure uniform application of the law, and protect the voting rights of Texans everywhere in the State:

- First, the Secretary must issue additional guidance, and do so in a way to make sure that it is received, even if this means directly contacting each individual library that is out of compliance. The Secretary must also send this guidance to those who operate and have authority over public libraries to make sure that it is being heard. For example, this might include Library Boards of Directors, attorneys in city and county attorney's offices, or city council or commissioners' court members themselves when libraries are operated by those entities; we cannot expect our busy librarians to evaluate these rules on their own.
- Second, the Secretary must also provide guidance to voter registrars in each county regarding these rules, and their responsibilities independent of libraries, including in backdating voter registration applications to the date that the library received the completed form. The SOS must also provide voter registrars in each county with training and instructions on how to counsel their local libraries on these issues.
- Third, the Secretary must, as a last resort, seek enforcement actions or refer non-complying libraries for enforcement in accordance with its duties under the Texas Election Code. While it is imperative that libraries be provided proper education, if they continue to ignore their legal obligations, they must eventually be held to account.¹⁴

X. CONCLUSION AND CALL TO ACTION

While extremely troubling that public libraries have been out of compliance with our election laws for decades—and where many had never even heard of such rules—it is a great success to see hundreds of libraries gain new understandings of voter registration requirements and libraries' roles in them. As noted above, TCRP conservatively estimates that public libraries will collect and submit some 300,000 new and updated voter registrations in each four-year election cycle, making this a critical piece of Texas's elections infrastructure that will serve primarily new and young voters, rural voters, voters experiencing homeless, low-income voters, and voters of color.

While this Report details one strategy for determining if libraries are complying with their obligations under the NVRA and the Texas Election Code and the results of that strategy, it is not possible for TCRP to check for actual day-to-day compliance at each of these libraries or their many branches. Even if it were possible to visit them all, a library patron must usually be a resident of the city or county in order to get a library card, and thereby be eligible for voter registration services. But you can help!
